- They are used with countable nouns in the singular form.
 - A chair
 - An elephant
 - A banana
 - An airplane
- 


some


- Used with countable in the plural
 - **Some** chairs
 - **Some** elephants
 - **Some** bananas
 - **Some** airplanes
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- With uncountable
- **Some** milk
- **some** sugar
- **some** bread

- In the interrogative for offers or requests
- Would you like **some** milk?
- Can I have **some** sugar, please?

any

- Used with countable in the plural and uncountable nouns.
 - In questions and negative forms
 - Is there **any** milk in the fridge?
 - Are there **any** sandwiches on the table?
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- There isn't **any** bread
 - There aren't **any** eggs in the fridge
