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ADVERBS OF MANNER

Rule

- Adverbs of manner form the largest group of adverbs.
- We make most of them simply by adding ly to their corresponding adjective.
- Adverbs of manner that do not end in -ly are shown in **bold**.

Part I

brightly accidentally correctly angrily busily courageously calmly anxiously cruelly awkwardly carefully daringly deliberately carelessly badly beautifully doubtfully cautiously eagerly blindly cheerfully boldly clearly easily closely bravely elegantly

Part II

fondly enormously greedily foolishly enthusiastically happily hard fortunately equally eventually frankly hastily healthily exactly frantically faithfully honestly generously fast hungrily gently fatally gladly hurriedly inadequately fiercely gracefully

Part III

loudly ingeniously painfully innocently madly patiently perfectly inquisitively mortally irritably politely mysteriously joyously neatly poorly powerfully justly nervously kindly noisily promptly obediently lazily punctually quickly loosely openly

Part IV

quietly roughly silently rudely rapidly sleepily rarely slowly sadly really safely smoothly recklessly selfishly SO sensibly regularly softly reluctantly seriously solemnly repeatedly speedily sharply rightfully shyly stealthily

Part V

tensely stealthily weakly thoughtfully sternly wearily straight tightly well truthfully wildly stupidly successfully wisely unexpectedly suddenly victoriously violently suspiciously swiftly vivaciously tenderly warmly

ADVERBS OF PLACE

Rule

- Adverbs of place tell us where something happens.
- They are usually placed after the main verb or after the clause that they modify.
- Adverbs of place do not modify adjectives or other adverbs

about	downstairs	on
above	east (etc)	out
abroad	elsewhere	outside
anywhere	far	over
away	here	there
back	in	towards
backwards	indoors	under
(also backward)	inside	up
behind	near	upstairs
below	nearby	where
down	off	

ADVERBS OF FREQUENCY

Uses

- To discuss how often something happens.
- To indicate routine or repeated activities, so they are often used with the present simple tense.

Frequency	Adverb of Frequency	Example Sentence
100%	always	I always go to bed before 11pm.
90%	usually	I usually have cereal for breakfast.
80%	normally / generally	I normally go to the gym.
70%	often* / frequently	I often surf the internet.
50%	sometimes	I sometimes forget my wife's birthday.
30%	occasionally	I occasionally eat junk food.
10%	seldom	I seldom read the newspaper.
5%	hardly ever / rarely	I hardly ever drink alcohol.
0%	never	I never swim in the sea.

ADVERBS OFTIME

Uses

- Adverbs of time tell us when an action happened, but also for how long, and how often.
- Adverbs that tell us when are usually placed at the end of the sentence.
